

Children's Sunday School (age 3 through Fifth Grade)

Sunday School offers a great opportunity for children to build relationships with teachers, peers, and others in their church community, and to learn about our faith in interactive ways. At present our pre-K and elementary age classes follow a Bible-based curriculum that mirrors the worship readings for each Sunday. This allows our young parishioners to connect more meaningfully with the lessons they hear in the worship service each week.

Our Sunday School classes meet by grade level from 10:00-11:00am on Sunday morning during the school year. Following is the listing of classroom locations (all on the first floor) for each grade:

- 3 and 4 Year Old: Room 132

Youth Sunday School (Sixth through Twelfth Grade)

Sunday School for middle school and high school students focuses not just on understanding scripture, but also applying that knowledge to their own lives and world events. It also focuses on helping young people take ownership of their own faith journey.

Sixth and Seventh Grade youth use a curriculum called "Connect", which focuses on people in the Bible and how the stories relate to pre-teen life. This two-year curriculum spends one year focused on people from the Old Testament and the other focused on people from the New Testament.

The Eighth Grade year focuses on Christian and Episcopalian principles as we prepare youth for Confirmation. Regardless of whether a youth pursues Confirmation, all eighth grade students experience a class to explore where they stand in their faith journey. Ninth and Tenth Grade youth use a curriculum called "Re:form Ancestors". The class looks at the similarities they share with our faith ancestors and applies the lessons to teen life today.

Eleventh and Twelfth Grade students use a curriculum called "LinC", which uses current events to explore how our faith lives intersect with the real world.
